How Sudbury Catholic District School Board Schools Respond When a Student Talks About Suicide

Our Commitment

The safety and well-being of students is our top priority. When a student expresses thoughts of suicide, school staff respond immediately, with compassion and care.

What Staff Do First

- Listen and stay with the student. No student is ever left alone if they say they might be unsafe.
- Take it seriously. All disclosures of suicide risk are responded to with care.
- Act quickly. Staff follow the school board's suicide response protocol, aligned with Ontario's Ministry of Education direction.

Who Gets Involved

- School staff (teachers, child & youth workers, educational assistants) provide immediate support.
- Principals/designates are notified right away.
- Mental health professionals (school social workers) become involved when available.
- Parents/guardians are contacted as soon as possible.

If a mental health professional is not at the school that day, staff consult with other board clinicians, community crisis teams, or emergency services.

Levels of Response

- If risk is low → The student is connected with a safe adult at school and mental health staff follow up.
- If risk is moderate → A safety plan is developed with the student, family, and school staff.
- If risk is high or urgent → Crisis services or 911 are contacted to ensure the student's immediate safety.

Parent and Caregiver Role

Parents and caregivers are vital partners. If your child expresses suicidal thoughts at school, you can expect:

- A call from the school as soon as possible.
- Clear information about what your child has shared.
- An invitation to collaborate on a plan for safety and ongoing support.
- Guidance about community resources that can help.

If Parents Cannot Be Reached

If we cannot reach parents/guardians and believe the child is at risk:

- We will connect with alternate emergency contacts on file.
- If necessary, crisis services or emergency services will be involved.
- Students are never released from school care until a safe transfer is arranged.

Aftercare and Follow-Up

- Schools work with families to plan a safe, supportive return for the student.
- A "safe adult" at school is identified for regular check-ins.
- Ongoing supports are offered through school and community resources.

Key Message for Families

- Talking about suicide is always taken seriously.
- Your child will be supported, never left alone, and connected to the right help.
- You will be contacted and included in the plan as soon as possible.
- Our goal is safety, compassion, and collaboration.
